POLICY:

This policy establishes guidelines for the proper disposal of Non Controlled and Controlled medications.

STANDARDS:

Medication for disposal will be overseen by the Agency Nurse in accordance with the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and/or the onsite pharmacy guidelines for disposal set forth by the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA).

PROCEDURES:

- Segregate discontinued, expired, damaged, or unwanted medication immediately from other medications.
- Any non-controlled medication in properly labeled medication packaging can be given to onsite pharmacy. The pharmacy will then follow disposal guidelines in accordance with the DEA.
- Any controlled medication or medication not disposed of by onsite pharmacy will be disposed of by Agency Nurse in the presence of a witness and in accordance with the DEQ disposal guidelines (chemotherapy drugs are not disposed of this way, refer back to prescribing doctor).

- Mix drugs (do not crush) in a disposable container with dirt, kitty litter or used coffee grounds and add a small amount of water to dissolve any solid medications. Wearing gloves is required when handling liquid medications.
- 2. Seal drugs in disposable container and then place in regular trash.
- 3. Document the disposal of medication, utilizing the "Disposal of Medications" form #138.
- 4. Render the label on the medication packaging illegible before placing in regular trash.
- Instruct people inquiring about proper disposal of medications to find a Michigan household drug take back site in their area by visiting: www.michigan.gov/deqdrugdisposal

Definitions:

Controlled Substances: Drugs, substances, and certain chemicals used to make drugs are classified in to five distinct schedules (I – V).
